- **What is the primary role of an adjective?** An adjective is a word that describes or provides more information about a noun or a pronoun.
- **How do adjectives change our perception?** By selecting precise adjectives, a writer can influence the reader's mood, such as changing a 'house' into a 'dreadful, decaying mansion' or a 'cozy, sun-drenched cottage'.
- **Can adjectives have synonyms?** Yes! Using a thesaurus to find more powerful adjectives, like swapping 'big' for 'colossal' or 'gigantic', helps create a more sophisticated vocabulary.
- **Where do adjectives usually sit?** In ELA, adjectives are most commonly placed before the noun they modify, though they can also follow verbs like 'is' or 'seems'.
- **Why should we avoid overusing adjectives?** While adjectives add detail, using too many can clutter a sentence; always aim for quality over quantity to ensure your writing remains clear.

Did you know? Did you know? The word 'adjective' comes from the Latin word 'adjectivus', which means 'to add'. Just as Max the monkey uses math to solve puzzles, writers use adjectives to add detail to their stories, turning a simple 'dog' into a 'shaggy, energetic, golden retriever'!
