

The Daily Forest Gazette: A Mystery in the Meadow

Learning objective: To identify and analyze the key features of a newspaper report, including headlines, subheadings, and the 5 Ws (Who, What, Where, When, Why).

Read the newspaper report carefully. Use your detective skills to identify how the reporter conveys information to the reader.

In a surprising turn of events yesterday afternoon, the Great Oak Meadow was transformed into a shimmering spectacle. At approximately 3:00 pm, residents discovered that all the local daisies had turned a vibrant shade of indigo. Max the monkey, who was busy calculating the probability of such an occurrence, was the first to report the phenomenon. 5. Do you think the mystery of the indigo daisies will be solved quickly? Justify your answer using evidence from the text. (3 marks)
