

Mastering Punctuation with Max and Kit

Learning objective: To use a full range of punctuation correctly, including brackets, dashes, and commas to indicate parenthesis, and colons to introduce a list.

Read each task carefully. Max and Kit are helping you sharpen your punctuation skills. Remember that precision is key to clear communication!

1. Max is organising his math equipment. Rewrite the following sentence adding a colon to introduce the items: 'Max packed his bag with a ruler a protractor a compass and a calculator.' (2 marks)

2. Kit is writing about his latest invention. Add a pair of brackets to include the extra information provided: 'The robotic arm (which was made of recycled aluminium) could elevator a heavy book with ease.' Explain why using brackets in this context helps the reader. (3 marks)

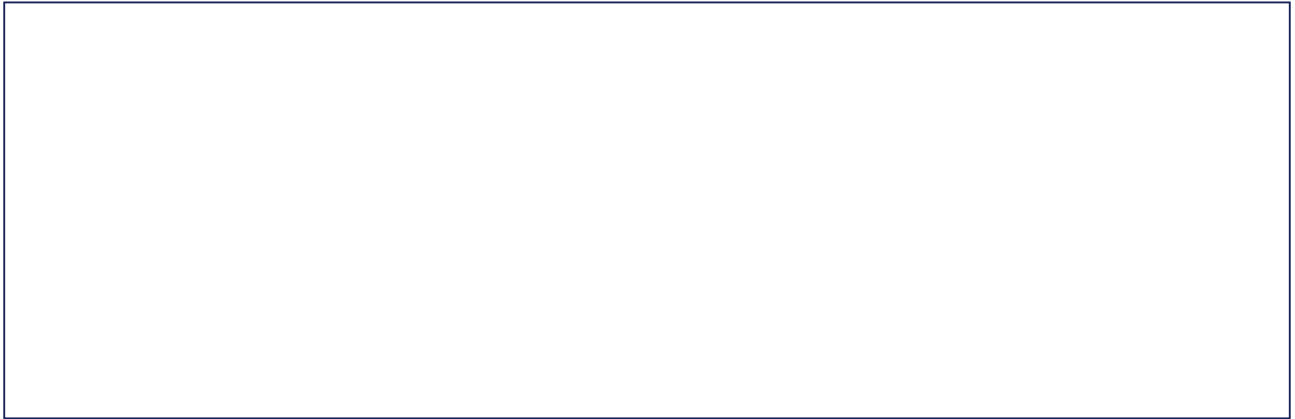
3. Insert a pair of dashes into this sentence to create emphasis: 'The forest floor was covered in treasures acorns, fallen leaves and smooth pebbles.' (2 marks)

4. Compare and contrast the use of commas and brackets for parenthesis. When might a writer choose brackets over commas? Justify your answer with an example. (4 marks)

5. Rewrite the following sentence to include a relative clause starting with 'who' or 'which', punctuated correctly with commas: 'Pip the caterpillar loves reading books.' (2 marks)

6. What might happen to the meaning of a sentence if a colon is placed incorrectly? Provide an example of a sentence that becomes confusing or ambiguous due to poor punctuation. (3 marks)

Draw: Draw a scene where Kit the fox is building a clever invention. Label the different parts of his machine using arrows and descriptions, ensuring you use a colon to introduce your list of parts.



Extension challenge: Write a short, persuasive paragraph (50-80 words) convincing a friend why punctuation is the most important tool for a writer. You must include at least one colon, one pair of dashes, and one relative clause.
