

Story Explorers with Pip the Bookworm

Learning objective: To understand the structure of a story, including characters, settings, and the beginning, middle, and end.

Read the questions carefully. Think about the stories you have read with Pip the Bookworm and answer the questions below using full sentences where you can.

Pip the Bookworm loves to collect words from all sorts of stories. Every great story has a character, a place where the story happens, and a sequence of events that make it exciting.

Word bank: character · setting · beginning · middle · end · problem · solution

1. Every story needs someone to act in it. What do we call the person or animal in a story? (1 mark)

2. What is the word for the place where a story happens? (Hint: Think about where the characters go). (1 mark)

3. A story is usually split into three parts. Can you name the three parts of a story? (3 marks)

4. If a character loses their favorite toy, what part of the story is this called? (Choose from: The beginning, The problem, or The end). (1 mark)

5. If you were writing a story about Max the Monkey, what setting would you choose for his adventure? (2 marks)

Draw: Draw a picture of your favorite story setting. Make sure to include a character inside your drawing!



Extension challenge: Write one sentence to describe what happens at the very end of your favorite story.
