- A biome is a large area of the world defined by its specific climate, plants, and animals.
- Tropical rainforests are located near the Equator and stay warm and wet all year round.
- Tundra biomes are found in the Arctic and high mountains, where the soil is often frozen.
- Grasslands, also known as savannas or prairies, have enough rain to support grasses but not many trees.
- Temperate deciduous forests experience four distinct seasons and are home to trees that shed their leaves in fall.
- Aquatic biomes are the largest of all, covering over 70% of the Earth's surface and including oceans and freshwater rivers.

Did you know? Did you know? Even though deserts are known for being scorching hot, there are also 'cold deserts' like the Antarctic, which is the largest desert on Earth because it receives very little precipitation throughout the year!
