

Finn's Journey Down the River

Learning objective: To understand the stages of a river's journey from source to mouth.

Read the passage carefully and answer the questions below using full sentences.

Finn the dolphin is an expert at navigating water, but he loves rivers just as much as the sea. A river begins its journey at the source, usually high up in the mountains. Here, the water is cold, fast-moving, and narrow. As the river travels downhill, it gains speed and power, wearing away the rock in a process called erosion. Soon, smaller streams called tributaries join the main river, making it wider and deeper. When the river reaches flatter land, it starts to curve and bend in wide loops known as meanders. Finn loves to splash in these calm, winding sections. Eventually, the river reaches the end of its long journey, which is called the mouth. This is where the river flows into a larger body of water, such as a sea or an ocean. The land around the river, known as the river basin, provides a vital home for many plants and animals. By understanding how rivers change as they flow, we can see how they shape the landscape of our planet.

5. Why is it important for us to protect the land surrounding a river basin? Give a reason for your answer. (3 marks)
