Learning objective: To describe and explain why settlements are located in specific places, using geographical vocabulary.

Use this scaffold to write a report about a settlement you have studied or imagined. Use the questions to help you structure your paragraphs, and remember to use the word bank to connect your ideas.

5. Conclusion: Why do you think this settlement has grown over time? Start by saying: In conclusion, this place is a successful settlement because... (2 marks)
