

Journeys of Faith: Understanding Pilgrimage

Learning objective: To identify the reasons why people of faith undertake a pilgrimage and explore the significance of sacred journeys.

Read each question carefully and use your knowledge of world religions to provide thoughtful, well-reasoned answers. Write in full sentences where possible.

A pilgrimage is a meaningful journey undertaken by a person of faith to a place that they consider sacred or holy. For many, this is a time for reflection, prayer, and feeling closer to the divine. Some pilgrims travel to ask for forgiveness, to give thanks, or to seek guidance during a difficult time in their lives. These journeys often involve visiting ancient sites, temples, churches, or natural landmarks that hold deep historical and spiritual significance for their specific religion.

1. Max the monkey is confused. He thinks a holiday is the same as a pilgrimage. Explain the difference between a holiday and a pilgrimage using your own words. (2 marks)

2. Identify two reasons why a person might feel it is important to visit a sacred site in person, rather than just reading about it in a book. (2 marks)

3. Ellie the elephant remembers that many religions have specific paths for pilgrims to follow. Why might following a traditional route be significant for a pilgrim? (2 marks)

4. Compare and contrast: How might the experience of a pilgrimage be different for a person traveling alone compared to someone traveling as part of a large group? (3 marks)

5. Justify your answer: If a person is unable to travel, do you believe they can still experience the benefits of a pilgrimage? Explain your reasoning. (3 marks)

6. What might happen if a sacred site became a popular tourist attraction? Discuss the potential impact on the pilgrims who visit for religious reasons. (3 marks)

Draw: Draw a scene showing a pilgrim arriving at a place of significance. Include symbols or items they might carry, such as a map, a journal, or a special token of their journey.



Extension challenge: Imagine you are an explorer like Finn the dolphin. Write a short journal entry (100-150 words) describing the atmosphere of a sacred site you have visited. Use descriptive language to explain how the environment helps a pilgrim feel a sense of peace or connection to their beliefs.
