

Nova's Night-Time Sound Safari

Learning objective: To understand how sound is made, how it travels through different mediums, and how we hear sounds using our ears.

Join Nova the barn owl on a nocturnal adventure! Read the questions carefully and use your knowledge of sound to help Nova identify the forest noises. Each question is worth 1 mark.
