

A Smile for Science with Bea the Bee

Learning objective: To identify the different types of human teeth and describe their functions.

Read the text carefully and answer the questions below. Use full sentences where appropriate.

Bea the honeybee loves visiting the local school to explain how humans eat. Did you know that humans have four different types of teeth, each with a special job? At the front of your mouth, you have sharp, apartment teeth called incisors. These are perfect for biting into a crunchy apple. Next to them are the pointy canines, which are designed to tear food. Further back in your mouth, you will find premolars and molars. These teeth are wider and have flatter surfaces, making them excellent for crushing and grinding food into smaller pieces. This process is the very first step of digestion. Protecting all of your teeth is a hard, shiny outer layer called enamel. It is the strongest substance in your body! However, you must take care of your enamel by brushing twice a day and avoiding too many sugary snacks. If you don't look after your teeth, bacteria can create tiny holes called cavities. Remember, healthy teeth are essential for a happy, healthy smile!

1. Name the two types of teeth that are used for crushing and grinding food. (2 marks)

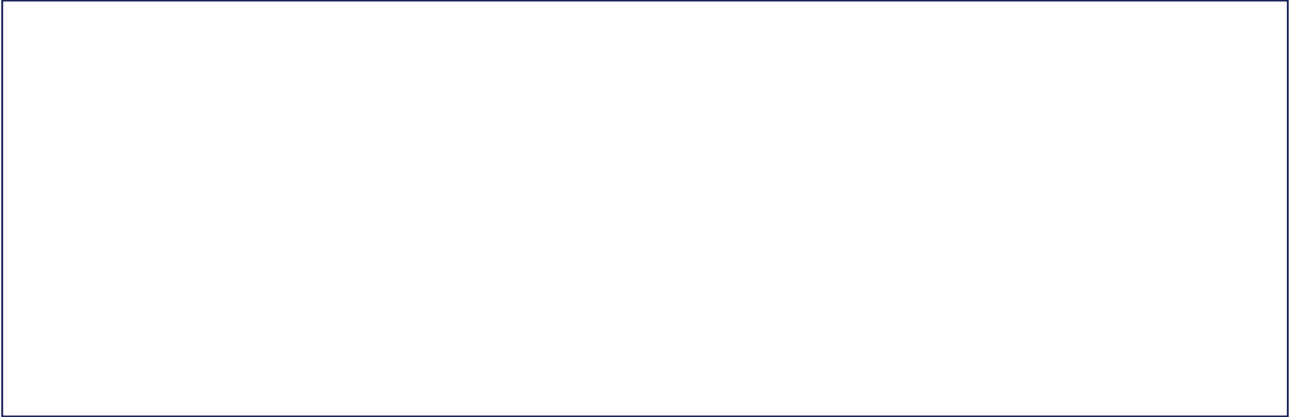
2. What is the name of the strong, shiny outer layer that protects your teeth? (1 mark)

5. Why is it important to look after your enamel? Give a reason for your answer. (3 marks)

Extension challenge: Research how many teeth a typical adult has compared to a child. Write a short paragraph explaining the difference.
