

Rosa's Spanish Number Adventure

Learning objective: To read, write, and recognize Spanish numbers from 1 to 20 and understand their use in simple prices.

Read the story below carefully. Use the word bank to help you translate and solve the math challenges set by Rosa the parrot.

Rosa the parrot has opened a colorful market stall in the forest. She is selling delicious tropical fruit to all her friends. Pip the caterpillar visits the stall to buy some snacks. 'Hola, Rosa!' says Pip. 'How much does a mango cost?' Rosa chirps, 'It costs tres pounds (£3).' Pip decides to buy four papayas, which cost cinco pounds (£5) each. Next, Max the monkey arrives. He wants to buy twelve bananas, and each banana costs dos pounds (£2). Rosa reminds everyone that when counting items in Spanish, you must use the correct number word.

Word bank: uno (1) · dos (2) · tres (3) · cuatro (4) · cinco (5) · seis (6) · siete (7) · ocho (8) · nueve (9) · diez (10) · once (11) · doce (12) · trece (13) · catorce (14) · quince (15) · dieciséis (16) · diecisiete (17) · dieciocho (18) · diecinueve (19) · veinte (20) · cuesta (costs)

1. Using the word bank, write the Spanish word for the number 14 and the number 19. (2 marks)

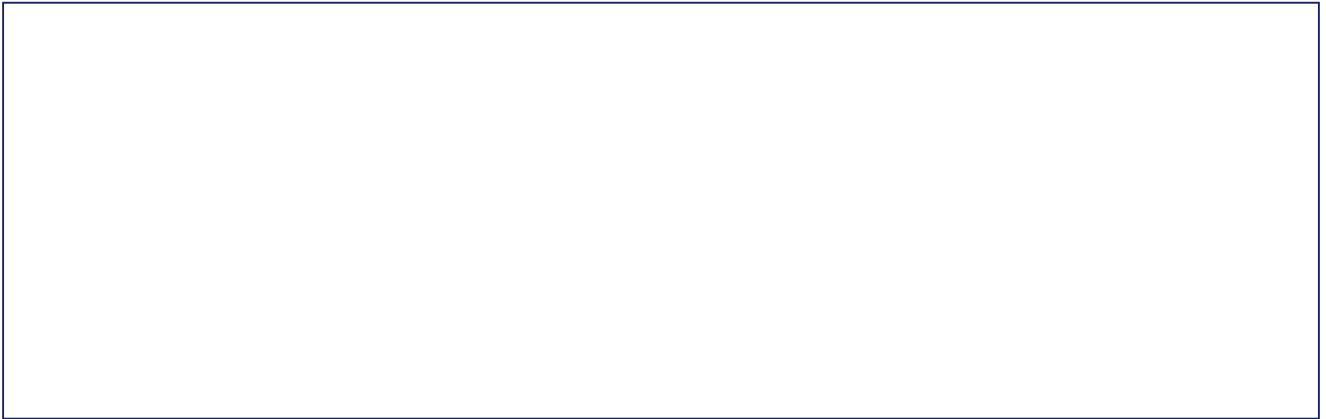
2. If a mango costs 'tres' pounds, what is the price in English currency? (2 marks)

3. Pip bought four papayas at £5 each. Calculate the total cost in pounds (£) and write the number in Spanish words. (3 marks)

4. Max wants to buy twelve bananas. Translate the number 'twelve' into Spanish. (1 mark)

5. If Rosa has 'dieciséis' apples and sells 'seis' of them, how many does she have left? Write your answer as a Spanish number word. (2 marks)

Draw: Draw Rosa the parrot standing behind her fruit stall. Label three items on her stall using their Spanish number names (e.g., 'siete manzanas').



Extension challenge: Can you write a short dialogue between two friends at a market using at least three different Spanish numbers to describe the price of items?
