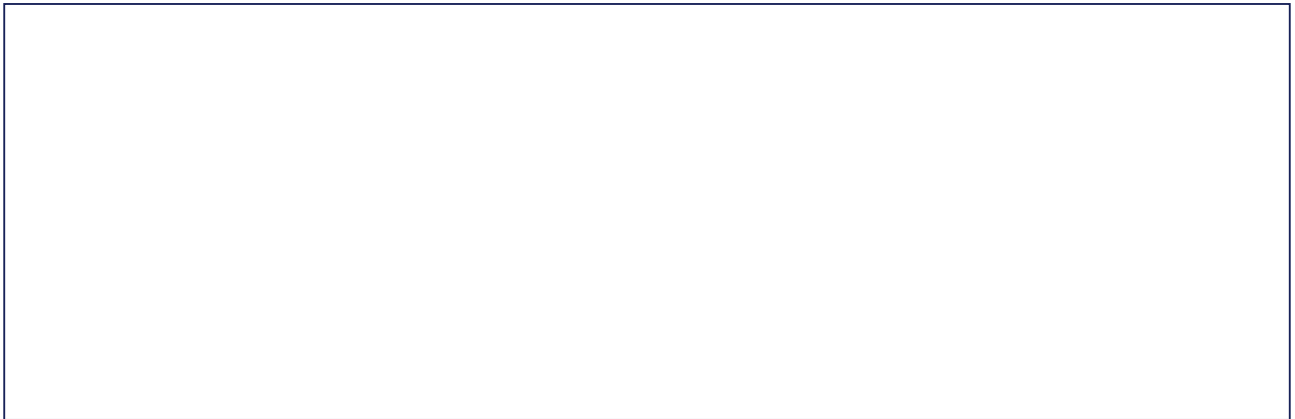
7. 7. Which tense should you use when writing a report about facts? (One word answer) (1 mark)
