Learning objective: To demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the key beliefs, practices, and community life of Sikhism.

Sikhism began in the Punjab region of India. It was started by Guru Nanak. Sikhs believe in one God and that everyone is equal. They go to a place of worship called a Gurdwara. Inside, they eat a meal together called Langar. This meal is free for everyone. Sikhs also believe in Seva, which means helping others without asking for anything back.

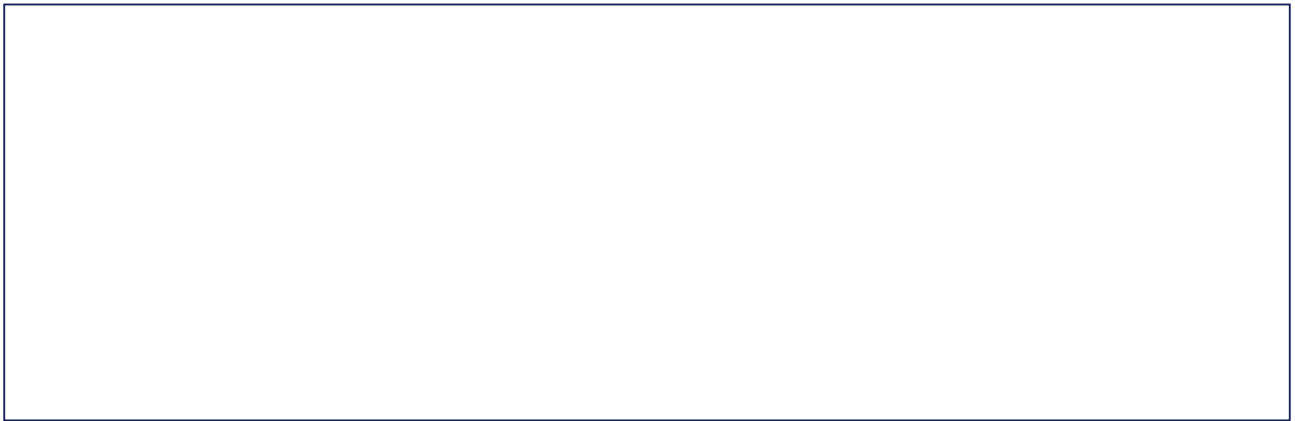
