

Social Studies / History Assessment: The Suffragettes

Learning objective: To understand the struggle for women's right to vote in the UK.

Read each question carefully. Use the word bank if you need help. Write your answers in the boxes provided.

In the past, women in the UK were not allowed to vote in elections. This meant they could not help choose who made the laws. A group of women called the Suffragettes worked hard to change this. Their leader was Emmeline Pankhurst. They held marches and protests to show that women deserved the same rights as men. It took a long time, but eventually, the law was changed.
