Learning objective: To understand the techniques, vocabulary, and artistic potential of creating collages using varied textures and materials.

4. 4. What is the specific artistic term for the 'glue' or bonding agent used to attach pieces to your collage base? (1 mark)

5. 5. Which technique involves placing one piece of material partially over another to create depth? A) Juxtaposition B) Overlay* C) Carving D) Drafting (1 mark)

6. 6. If Zara uses old buttons, twigs, and bits of fabric, what are these items collectively called? A) Found objects* B) Rubbish C) Sculptures D) Canvases (1 mark)

7. 7. True or False: Using different materials like sandpaper, silk, and foil helps the viewer experience 'texture' through touch. (1 mark)

10. 10. Which artistic principle describes the way your eyes move across the collage from the focal point to the rest of the work? (1 mark)

Extension challenge: 1. Explain why an artist might choose to use 'found objects' rather than buying brand-new art supplies. 2. Compare and contrast a traditional painting with a mixed-media collage; which do you think is more effective at showing 'energy', and why? 3. Justify your answer: Does the order in which you layer your materials change the meaning of the artwork? 4. What might happen if an artist used only transparent materials in a collage? 5. If you were commissioned to create a collage representing the history of your town, which items would you select and why? 6. Propose a new way to display a collage that isn't just hanging it flat on a wall.
