Explanation: Landscape art uses scale and colour to create the illusion of depth. The foreground is usually detailed and dark, while the background appears lighter and less defined.

How does the choice of colour palette change the mood of a landscape? 6. If you were commissioned to paint a £500 landscape for a gallery, what key elements would you include to ensure it looks professional and balanced?
