- A fronted adverbial is a word, phrase, or clause placed at the beginning of a sentence to describe the verb that follows.
- Always remember to place a comma immediately after your fronted adverbial to separate it from the main clause.
- Adverbials of time tell us when something happens, for example: 'Before the sun rose, Kit checked his compass.'
- Adverbials of place describe where an action occurs, such as: 'In the heart of the forest, the fox spotted a puzzle.'
- Adverbials of manner explain how something is done, like: 'With great excitement, Kit solved the tricky computer code.'

Did you know? Did you know? Kit the Fox loves using fronted adverbials because they act like a spotlight! By moving the descriptive phrase to the front of a sentence, you change the focus and guide the reader's attention exactly where you want it. It is the secret ingredient to making your writing more dynamic and sophisticated.
