

Max's Magnificent Punctuation Adventure

Learning objective: To identify and understand the impact of various punctuation marks, including colons, semi-colons, and dashes, on the clarity and flow of a text.

Read the text carefully and answer the questions below. Ensure you use full sentences for your answers.

Max the monkey sat under the ancient oak tree, clutching a notepad filled with complex equations. He loved maths, but he struggled with the rules of writing. 'Punctuation is like a map for the reader,' Pip the caterpillar chirped, crawling onto a leaf. 'Without it, sentences become a tangled forest.' Max blinked, intrigued. 1. According to the text, what three items does Max need for his trip? (2 marks)

2. What punctuation mark does the text suggest is used to create a 'dramatic pause' or add an extra detail? (1 mark)

3. Why does Pip compare punctuation to a map? (2 marks)

4. How does Max's attitude toward writing change by the end of the passage? (2 marks)

5. Do you agree that punctuation is the most important part of writing a story? Give a reason for your answer. (3 marks)

Draw: Draw Max the monkey sitting under an oak tree with his notebook, and include a small 'punctuation forest' where the trees are shaped like commas, colons, and question marks.



Extension challenge: Write a short paragraph about your favourite hobby. Within your writing, you must include one colon to introduce a list, one semi-colon to join two independent clauses, and one pair of dashes to include extra information.
