- Connotation refers to the feeling a word gives you. A 'determined' person sounds positive, whereas a 'stubborn' person might sound difficult, even though they mean similar things.
- Fronted adverbials, such as 'Without a moment's hesitation', add rhythm and interest to your writing, helping to guide the reader through your story.
- Read widely and keep a vocabulary journal! The more you read, the more words you collect for your own creative writing adventures.
