

Rosa's Radiant Rainbow Garden

Learning objective: To recall and apply French colour vocabulary to describe natural features in a creative setting.

Follow the drawing prompt below to create your scene. Once your artwork is complete, use the vocabulary from the word bank to label your drawing in French. Ensure your labels are neatly written next to the correct items.

Draw: Draw a vibrant, detailed garden scene featuring a large, bright sun in the corner, fluffy clouds, a patch of lush grass, and at least three different types of flowers. Include a small creature, such as a butterfly or a bee. Use a variety of colours to make your scene pop. You may use pencils, felt-tips, or crayons. Ensure your drawing is clear enough to add French labels around the edges.



Label words: le soleil (jaune) · le ciel (bleu) · l'herbe (verte) · une fleur (rouge) · un papillon (orange) · un nuage (blanc) · la terre (marron) · une abeille (noire et jaune)

Steps:

1. Label your drawing using the French words for the colours and objects provided in the word bank.
2. Explain why it is important to match the gender of the adjective (e.g., rouge vs. verte) when describing the objects in your garden.

3. Compare and contrast the colours you have chosen for your garden with a garden found in a different season. How would the vocabulary change?
4. Justify your choice of colour for the sky. If you were drawing a storm instead of a sunny day, which French colour word would you use instead of 'bleu'?
5. What might happen if you decided to paint your garden using only 'couleurs primaires' (primary colours)? List them in French.
6. Creative Extension: Write a short sentence in French describing your favourite part of the garden (e.g., 'Le soleil est jaune.').
