

Rosa's Guide to French Opinions: Expressing Your Views!

Master the art of conversation with Rosa the Parrot—speak your mind in French!

- To express a strong preference, start your sentence with 'J'adore' followed by the noun.
- When you want to explain your opinion, use the word 'parce que' to add a reason.
- For things that are not your favourite, 'Je n'aime pas' is the perfect phrase to use.
- To describe an activity as boring, use the adjective 'ennuyeux' at the end of your sentence.
- Remember that French opinions are versatile; you can combine any phrase with an adjective to be more descriptive.

Did you know? Did you know? In French, when you say you like something, you often use a 'definite article' (le, la, or les). So, instead of saying 'I like apples', a French speaker says 'J'aime les pommes'—literally, 'I like the apples'. It is a small detail that makes you sound like a true local!
