Which region of England is known for the Lake District National Park and historically significant industrial cities like Manchester?

The North West of England.

Define the term 'topography' and explain how the topography of the Scottish Highlands differs from the South of England.

Topography is the arrangement of the natural and artificial physical features of an area. The Highlands are mountainous and rugged, whereas the South is generally flatter with rolling hills.

Which UK region has the highest population density and contains the capital city?

The South East of England, which contains London.

Compare and contrast the climate of the West Coast of the UK with the East Coast.

The West Coast generally experiences higher rainfall due to prevailing south-westerly winds from the Atlantic, while the East Coast is often drier and cooler.

What are the four constituent countries that make up the United Kingdom?

England, Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland.

Justify why many major UK cities were historically built near rivers or coastlines.

Rivers and coastlines provided essential transport routes for trade, access to water for industry, and a food source through fishing.

Which region of the UK is famous for its Snowdonia mountain range and unique cultural heritage?

Wales.

Explain why the South East of England is a major hub for international tourism and business.

It has excellent transport links (airports and ports), proximity to Europe, and a high concentration of historical sites and economic centres.

What might happen to the economy of a coastal town if its primary industry, such as fishing or tourism, were to decline?

It might lead to unemployment, a decrease in the local population as people move for work, and a potential shift towards new industries like renewable energy or tech.

Identify the main difference between a 'region' and a 'country' in the context of the UK.

A country is a sovereign state or a constituent nation, whereas a region is a specific area within a country often defined by shared geographical, cultural, or economic characteristics.

Which region is known for the Giant's Causeway and its rugged northern coastline?

Northern Ireland.

Describe the economic importance of the Midlands in the UK.

The Midlands has historically been the heart of the UK's manufacturing and engineering industry, often referred to as the 'industrial heartland'.
