- **Mary Seacole** was a pioneering British-Jamaican nurse who set up the 'British Hotel' behind the lines during the Crimean War to provide food and medical care for soldiers.
- **Walter Tull** was a professional footballer and became one of the first Black officers to lead white British troops into battle during the First World War, showing immense courage.
- **Olaudah Equiano**, a formerly enslaved man who settled in Britain in the 18th century, wrote a powerful autobiography that helped shift public opinion against the slave trade.
- **Phyllis Wheatley** was an extraordinary poet whose work challenged contemporary stereotypes and proved the intellectual capabilities of Black people in the 18th century.
- **Black History Month** serves as a vital reminder that British history is a tapestry woven from the stories, struggles, and triumphs of people from all backgrounds.

Did you know? Did you know? Black History Month was first celebrated in the UK in 1987. It was organised by Akyaaba Addai-Sebo, a Ghanaian analyst, to help Black children in Britain understand their roots and to share the rich, untold stories of Black achievement with the wider community.
