- **The Home Front:** While soldiers fought abroad, people at home worked in factories, served as fire wardens, and joined the Women's Land Army to support the war effort.
- **Air Raid Shelters:** Many families built Anderson shelters in their gardens, made from corrugated steel, to provide protection during nightly air raids.
- **Fashion and Utility:** Due to fabric shortages, clothing was strictly regulated; 'Utility' labels ensured clothes were made with the minimum amount of material possible.
