6. 6. What is the musical term for a short, repeating rhythmic pattern? (1 mark)

8. 8. What is the vertical line called that divides music into equal sections? (1 mark)

9. 9. What do we call the technique of stressing the 'off-beat' or the weaker part of the rhythm? (1 mark)

10. 10. True or False: Rhythm is the pattern of different note lengths, while pulse is the constant underlying beat. (1 mark)

Draw: Draw a set of musical notes on a staff that represents a 4/4 time signature, using at least two different note types (e.g., crotchets and minims).



Extension challenge: Max challenges you to think deeper: 1) Explain why a composer might choose a fast tempo for an action sequence but a slow tempo for a lullaby. 2) Compare and contrast how a drummer and a singer use rhythm differently. 3) Justify why it is important for a band to follow the same pulse. 4) What might happen to the 'feel' of a song if the time signature changed from 4/4 to 3/4 halfway through? 5) If you were to compose a piece about a busy market, which rhythmic patterns would you use to represent the crowd? 6) Critique the effect of syncopation on a listener—does it make the music feel more predictable or more exciting? Explain your answer.
