Did you know? Did you know? The Djembe drum, originating from West Africa, is carved from a single piece of hardwood and topped with animal skin. Its name comes from the Bambara phrase 'Anke djé, anke bé,' which translates to 'everyone gather together in peace,' perfectly capturing the communal spirit of world music!
