

A Winter Celebration: Customs and Traditions

Learning objective: To understand the cultural and historical significance of Christmas traditions in the UK.

Read the passage carefully and answer the questions below in full sentences. Use evidence from the text to support your answers.

Christmas is a significant festival celebrated annually on the 25th of December. While many people associate the day with festive decorations and gift-giving, its roots are deeply intertwined with both religious observance and ancient winter celebrations. In the United Kingdom, the season is a time for families to gather and reflect on the year passed. Historically, the tradition of decorating evergreen trees reflects a desire to celebrate life during the darkest days of the winter solstice. Similarly, the act of giving gifts is often linked to stories of generosity and kindness, encouraging individuals to think of others during the coldest months. Ellie the elephant, who loves to study history, notes that many modern customs, such as sharing a hearty meal, have evolved from ancient harvest feasts designed to build community spirit. Today, whether celebrated through religious services, festive lighting displays, or the simple joy of sharing a meal, the season serves as a universal reminder of hope, friendship, and the importance of community during the winter season.

2. What is the primary reason given for the tradition of gift-giving during this season? (2 marks)

3. Explain why Ellie the elephant believes that modern Christmas meals are linked to ancient harvest feasts. (3 marks)

4. How does the author suggest that the atmosphere of Christmas has changed from its ancient roots to the present day? (3 marks)

5. Do you think the charitable aspect of Christmas is its most important feature? Justify your answer using examples from the text. (4 marks)

Extension challenge: Compare and contrast the modern Christmas celebration with another festival you have studied.
