5. Personal Reflection: Explain why it is important to think about those who may find the festive season difficult or lonely. What might happen if we made a greater effort to include everyone in our community? (3 marks)

6. Conclusion: Summarise the core values of Christmas and how they could be applied throughout the rest of the year. (2 marks)

Extension challenge: Imagine you are Ellie the elephant, who loves history and stories. Write a short diary entry from her perspective exploring how the traditions of Christmas have evolved over the last hundred years. Use your best vocabulary to describe the shift from material gifts to the 'gifts' of time and memory.
