Learning objective: To explore the religious and cultural significance of Easter, and to articulate personal reflections on themes of new life and hope.

Use this writing scaffold to structure your reflection on Easter. Ensure you use sophisticated vocabulary and justify your perspectives with clear reasoning. Refer to historical or symbolic meanings where appropriate.

As spring breathes new life into the landscape, the season of Easter invites us to reflect deeply on themes of hope and transformation.

1. The Origins of Easter: Explain the religious significance of Easter for Christians. How does this event represent a central pillar of their faith? (3 marks)

2. Symbolism in Nature: Compare and contrast the use of eggs and spring flowers as symbols of new life. Why might these specific symbols have been chosen? (3 marks)

3. Cultural Traditions: Describe a specific Easter tradition. Justify why traditions like these are important for bringing communities together. (2 marks)

4. Personal Reflection: What does the concept of 'renewal' mean to you personally? Explain how this theme can be applied to life outside of the Easter season. (3 marks)

5. Critical Analysis: What might happen if we stopped celebrating ancient festivals? Discuss the potential impact on our collective history and cultural identity. (4 marks)

6. Creative Synthesis: If you were to design a new symbol for Easter that represents peace in the modern world, what would it be and why? (3 marks)

Extension challenge: Write a short, evocative poem in the style of Leo the Lion, focusing on the sensory experiences of spring—the sights, sounds, and scents of the season—and how they link to the theme of hope.
