

Remembrance Day: A Reflective Assessment

Learning objective: To evaluate understanding of the significance of Remembrance Day, the symbolism of the poppy, and the importance of collective reflection in British society.

Read each question carefully. Use your historical knowledge and your ability to empathise to provide thoughtful, well-reasoned responses. Ensure your answers are written in clear, formal English.

Remembrance Day, observed on 11th November, marks the anniversary of the Armistice that ended the fighting in the First World War in 1918. At the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, many people across the United Kingdom observe a two-minute silence. This period of quiet reflection is dedicated to remembering those who served and sacrificed their lives in conflicts throughout history. The red poppy has become the enduring symbol of this day, inspired by the wildflowers that grew in the churned-up earth of the battlefields in Flanders.

1. Identify the specific date and time that Remembrance Day commemorates. Why is this specific moment significant in history? (2 marks)

2. Explain the symbolism of the red poppy. Why did this flower become the chosen emblem for Remembrance? (2 marks)

3. Max the monkey is curious about why we hold a two-minute silence. Explain the purpose of this silence and why it is considered a respectful way to observe the day. (3 marks)

4. Compare and contrast how individuals might mark Remembrance Day in a public setting versus a private setting. Why might both be equally important? (4 marks)

5. Nova the owl asks: 'Why do we continue to remember conflicts from over a century ago?' Justify why maintaining the tradition of Remembrance remains relevant for your generation. (4 marks)

6. Extended Writing Task: Write a reflective piece (approx. 100-150 words) exploring the concept of 'peace'. How can small acts of kindness in your school community contribute to the legacy of those remembered on this day? (5 marks)

7. If the government announced that schools would no longer participate in Remembrance ceremonies, what might happen to our collective understanding of history? Discuss the potential impact on society. (5 marks)

Draw: Draw a commemorative scene featuring a poppy field. Incorporate a symbol of peace and a symbol of history, as Ellie the elephant would, to show how the past connects to the present.
