

Rosa's Weekly Spanish Adventure

Learning objective: To recall and spell the days of the week in Spanish and understand their sequence within the week.

Join Rosa the parrot on her flight through the week! Read the questions carefully and complete the challenges to help her practise her Spanish. Remember: days of the week in Spanish do not start with a capital letter unless they begin a sentence.

Answer Key: 1. A (lunes), 2. True, 3. jueves, 4. B (domingo), 5. False (it is 'sábado'), 6. C (miércoles), 7. False, 8. viernes, 9. lunes, 10. D (jueves).

3. If today is miércoles, what day comes next? (Write your answer in Spanish) (1 mark)

4. Which day is 'domingo'? A) Friday B) Sunday* C) Saturday D) Monday (1 mark)

5. True or False: 'Viernes' is the Spanish word for Saturday. (1 mark)

6. Which day is the middle of the working week? A) lunes B) viernes C) miércoles* D) jueves (1 mark)

7. True or False: In Spanish, the days of the week are usually written with a capital letter at the start. (1 mark)

8. Rosa loves the end of the school week. What is Friday in Spanish? (1 mark)

9. If it is domingo today, what day is tomorrow? (Write your answer in Spanish) (1 mark)

10. Which day follows miércoles? A) lunes B) viernes C) martes D) jueves* (1 mark)

Draw: Draw a colourful 'Spanish Weekly Calendar' showing Rosa the parrot sitting on a branch. Next to each day, draw a small icon representing an activity for that day (e.g., a book for reading on lunes, a star for stargazing on jueves). Label each day in Spanish.



Extension challenge: 1. Explain why it is helpful to learn the days of the week in a sequence rather than as individual words. 2. Compare and contrast the English and Spanish spellings of the days. Which ones look similar? 3. Justify why the Spanish language does not typically use capital letters for days of the week. 4. If Rosa decides to fly to Spain for a holiday starting on 'sábado' and returning on 'lunes', how many days will she be away? 5. What might happen if you confused 'martes' and 'miércoles' when arranging a meeting with a friend? 6. Create a short Spanish diary entry for your weekend using 'sábado' and 'domingo'.
