

Rosa's Weekly Spanish Calendar

Learning objective: To recall, spell, and apply the days of the week in Spanish within a chronological context.

Join Rosa the parrot as she organises her busy week! Complete the tasks below to practise your Spanish vocabulary. Remember: in Spanish, the days of the week do not start with a capital letter unless they begin a sentence.

Word bank: lunes · martes · miércoles · jueves · viernes · sábado · domingo · hoy es... · mañana es...

1. Rosa is planning her poetry club. If today is 'lunes', what is the Spanish word for the day that comes tomorrow? Explain why it is important to understand the sequence of days when planning a schedule. (2 marks)

2. Translate the following sentence into Spanish: 'Today is Friday'. Then, write the Spanish word for the day that follows Friday. (2 marks)

3. Compare and contrast the days of the week in English and Spanish. Identify two days that contain an accent mark in Spanish. Justify why accurate spelling of these accents is necessary for clear communication. (3 marks)

4. If Rosa has a 'fiesta' on 'domingo' and another one exactly four days earlier, on which day is the first party? Show your working in Spanish. (2 marks)

5. What might happen if someone confused 'martes' with 'miércoles' when arranging a meeting? Use your own words to describe the potential consequences. (2 marks)

Draw: Draw a seven-spoked wheel. In each segment, write a day of the week in Spanish and draw a small symbol representing an activity Rosa might do on that day (e.g., a book for reading on lunes).



Extension challenge: Write a short, creative diary entry in Spanish for three consecutive days of your choosing (e.g., 'Hoy es lunes...'). Include one activity you did each day using simple Spanish verbs or nouns.
