

¡Los Números! Rosa's Spanish Number Guide

Master the mystery of Spanish numbers with Rosa the parrot!

- The numbers 0 to 15 have unique names in Spanish that must be memorised individually to build a strong foundation.
- When writing numbers between 31 and 99, always remember to include the conjunction 'y' between the tens and the units.
- The number 20 is 'veinte', but watch out for the spelling change to 'veinti-' when combined with numbers 21 to 29.
- Spanish numbers do not have genders, which makes them much simpler to use than nouns when describing quantities.
- To say 100 exactly, use 'cien'; however, if you are counting 101 or more, it changes to 'ciento'.

Did you know? Did you know? In Spanish, numbers from 31 to 99 are formed by taking the tens digit, adding the word 'y' (and), and then the ones digit. For example, 35 is 'treinta y cinco'. It is like a clever mathematical code waiting to be cracked!
