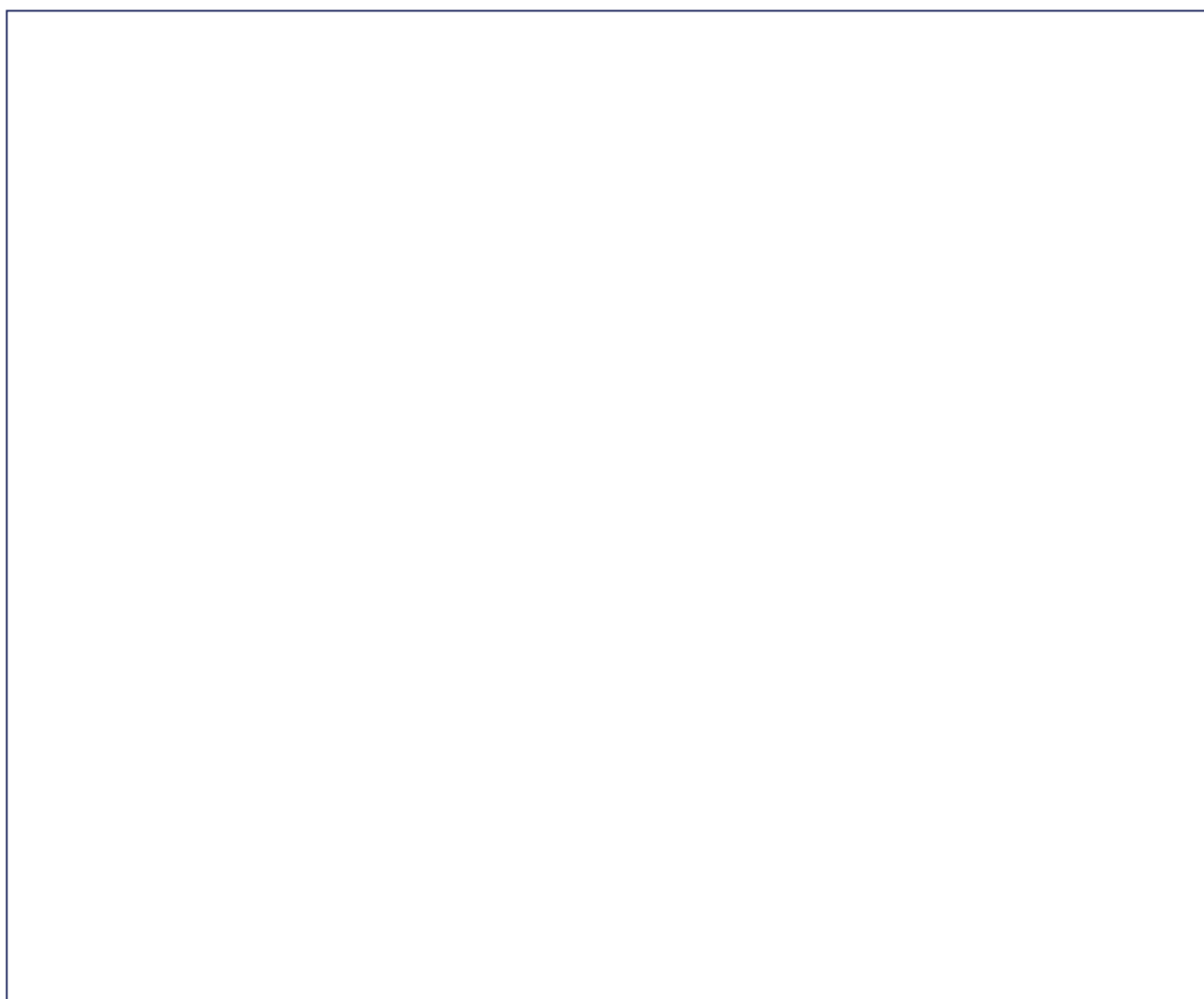


## Rosa's Art Gallery: Expressing Opinions in Spanish

*Learning objective: To use Spanish opinion phrases (e.g., Me gusta, No me gusta, Me encanta, Odio) to describe preferences for different items, and to justify these opinions using higher-order vocabulary.*

Welcome to the gallery! Rosa the parrot has curated an exhibition of interesting objects. Follow the drawing prompt to create your gallery display, then use the Spanish phrases in the word bank to label your items. Finally, answer the challenge questions to demonstrate your understanding.

**Draw:** Create a four-quadrant grid on your page. In each square, draw a different item: a healthy snack (e.g., an apple), an instrument (e.g., a guitar), a school subject (e.g., a maths book), and a weather scene (e.g., rain). Draw in a clear, illustrative style. Next to each item, draw a speech bubble. Inside the bubble, write a Spanish phrase from the word bank that matches your opinion of that item, and add a reason using 'porque es...'.



*Label words: Me encanta (I love it) · Me gusta (I like it) · No me gusta (I don't like it) · Odio (I hate it) · porque es... (because it is...) · divertido/a (fun) · aburrido/a (boring) · fantástico/a (fantastic) · horrible (horrible)*

### Steps:

1. Choose two items from your drawing. Write a sentence for each using an opinion phrase and a justification (e.g., 'Me encanta el perro porque es divertido').
2. Compare and contrast: Why might someone have a different opinion about an item in your gallery?

Explain how personal preference influences the use of these phrases.

3. Justify your choice of adjective: If you drew an item you 'odias' (hate), why is it important to use a strong adjective to express that opinion clearly?

4. What might happen if you used the phrase 'Me encanta' to describe something you actually found 'aburrido'? Discuss the impact on communication.
