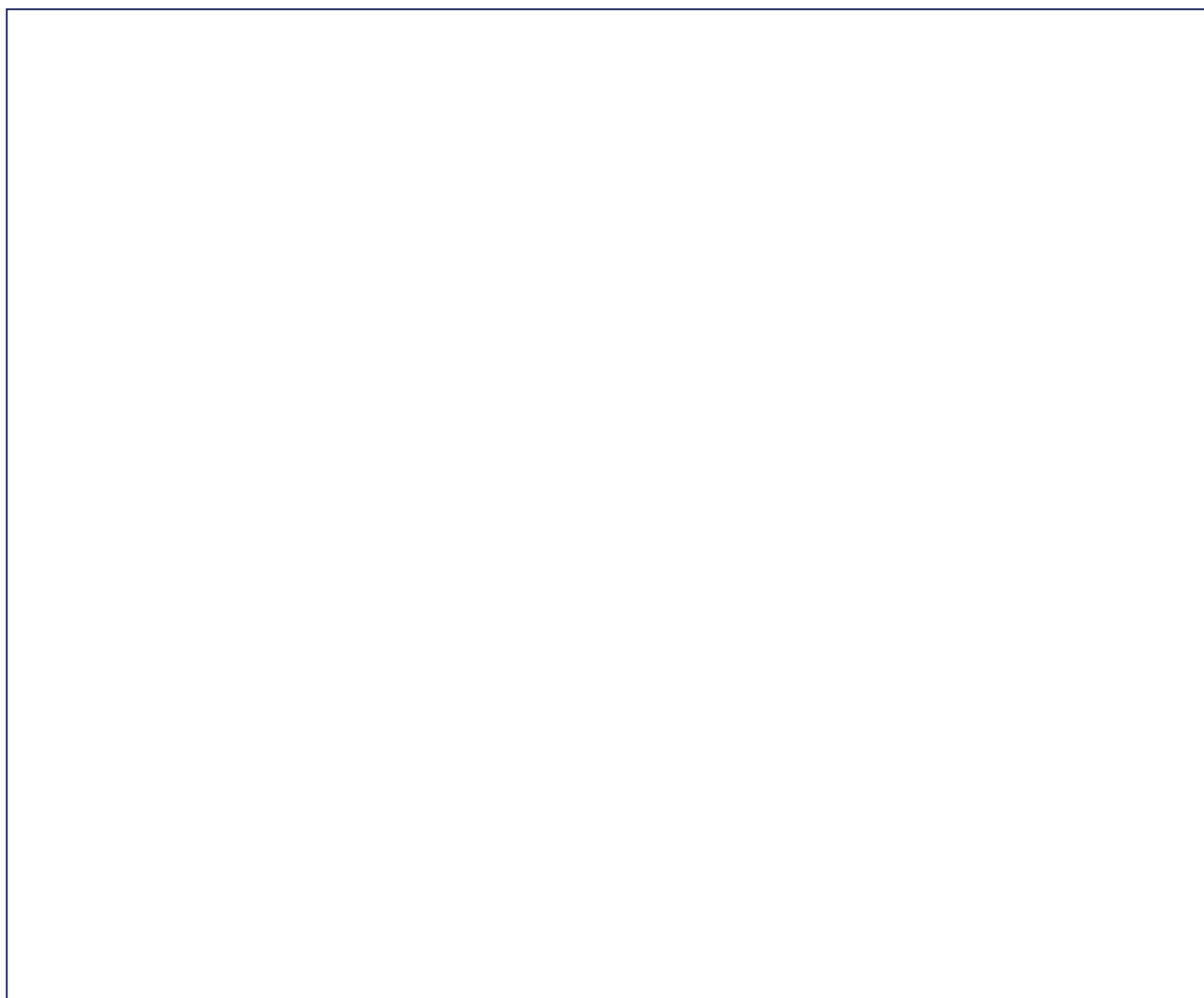


Rosa's Spanish Market Adventure

Learning objective: To use vocabulary related to shopping, prices, and food items in Spanish to label a creative scene.

Use the vocabulary in the word bank to label your market scene. Ensure your drawings are detailed enough to show what is being sold, and include price tags for each item using the £ symbol.

Draw: Draw a bustling outdoor market scene. Include Rosa the parrot standing behind a wooden stall. On the stall, display a variety of fruits and baked goods. Use a bright, colourful style. Ensure there is enough space around the items to write your Spanish labels and prices clearly. Add a customer character interacting with Rosa.



Label words: la manzana (apple) · el pan (bread) · el queso (cheese) · ¿Cuánto cuesta? (How much does it cost?) · cuesta... (it costs...) · la tienda (the shop) · caro (expensive) · barato (cheap)

Steps:

1. Draw a market stall with at least three different food items. Label each item in Spanish.
2. Add a price tag to each item using £. Write a sentence in Spanish next to one item to state its price (e.g., 'Cuesta tres libras').
3. Explain why it is important to ask '¿Cuánto cuesta?' before you choose to buy an item at a market.
4. Compare and contrast: If an apple costs £0.50 and a loaf of bread costs £2.50, which is 'barato' and which

is 'caro'? Justify your answer.

5. What might happen if you did not know the Spanish word for the item you wanted to buy? How could you communicate effectively using non-verbal cues?

6. Creative Extension: Imagine Rosa wants to buy enough bread for five friends. Write a short dialogue in Spanish where she asks for the total price for five loaves.
