4. Human Impact: Briefly mention how people use the coast and why it needs protection. Start your paragraph with: Many people visit the coast for leisure, but human activities can affect the shoreline, so we must... (2 marks)

5. Conclusion: Summarise your findings. Start your paragraph with: In conclusion, the coast is a fascinating place because it is a perfect example of how nature works to... (2 marks)
